## The Lost Hybrids of ... Irene Nuss

'Lenore Olivier' and named for Irene's son. Irene's hybrid B. 'Kentwood' was also highly awarded when it was released in the early 1960's. Irene received the Alfred D. Robinson Award for outstanding hybrids in 1970 and again in 1995.

**Irene Nuss** fell in love with begonias in 1959. She remembered exactly when, in an interview for the Los Angeles Times in an article entitled "Begonias & Beyond". She fell and she fell hard, by 1961 she was hybridizing in her home and a little obsessed with cane type begonias. She said in an article for the Begonian in 1971 "Somehow the canes have always seemed rather special to me. I like plants with showy blooms and find the canes very rewarding with their cascading clusters of flowers ranging in color from greenish white to white, pink, red, and brilliant orange, not to mention the various leaf shapes and coloring, especially in some of the newer hybrids. Oh yes, many have a delightful spicy fragrance about them."

By 1970 Irene was President of the Westchester CA Branch, 1970 recipient of the Alfred D. Robinson medal for outstanding Begonia hybrid 'Eunice Gray' and an active participant in ABS. She was honored, at 83 years old, in 2002 by the Huntington Botanical Gardens with a special recognition award. She shared the award with Brad Thompson and Rudy Ziesenhenne who were both friends as well as fellow hybridizers. All were known for sharing their knowledge freely and helping others to grow better Begonias.

## How to send us the hybrids you find:

- 1. Write the name of the cultivar and where it came from on a sealable sandwich bag using a waterproof marker.
- 2. Place a paper napkin, w/4-6 drops of water in the bag.
- 3. Pack each cutting (leaf or shoot) in the correctly named bag, seal the bag, and place the bag(s) in a shipping box

NOTE: A flexible shipping envelope increases risk of damage to the cuttings during shipping, so a rigid box or 2+ layers of bubble wrap will help to protect the plants.
